
#### **Description:**

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
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### Did You Know: CRISPR Gene Editing Has Helped Restore Vision in People With Inherited Blindness

In a groundbreaking clinical trial called BRILLIANCE, scientists have used CRISPR-Cas9 gene editing to treat a rare form of inherited childhood blindness Leber Congenital Amaurosis Type 10 (LCA10).

This is one of the first ever "in vivo" CRISPR therapies, meaning the gene editing was done directly inside the body — in this case, inside the retina of the eye instead of editing cells in the lab.





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#### **How It Works:**

- The condition is caused by a mutation in the CEP290 gene.
- Scientists used EDIT-101, a CRISPR-based therapy, to target & remove the faulty section of DNA inside retinal cells.
- The treatment was delivered via a subretinal injection directly into the eye.

#### **Who Participated:**

14 people (12 adults + 2 children) with severe vision loss from LCA10.
 All had mutations in the CEP290 gene — specifically the IVS26 variant.

#### What Improved:

- According to trial results:
  - > 79% of participants (11 out of 14) showed improvement in at least one measure of vision.
  - 43% improved in two or more areas.

#### Improvements included:

- Visual Clarity (acuity)
- Light Sensitivity
- > Ability To Navigate Mazes
- > Overall Vision-related Quality Of Life

#### **Safety & Limitations:**

- No serious side effects related to CRISPR itself.
- Mild side effects (e.g. inflammation) were linked to the surgical injection, not the gene editing.
- This therapy only works for people with a specific mutation (IVS26), so it's not yet a cure for all forms of blindness.

#### **Why It Matters:**

- > This marks a huge milestone for genetic medicine.
- It shows that CRISPR can safely edit genes in the human body, not just in the lab
- It opens the door to treating other genetic eye diseases and possibly many more conditions in the future.

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#### **Scope of Pharmacy:**

#### Scope Of Pharmacy In Clinical Research

#### What is Clinical Research?

Clinical research refers to investigations (clinical trials, observational studies, etc.) involving human subjects to evaluate the safety, efficacy, and optimal use of pharmaceutical products, medical devices, biologics, etc. Pharmacists in clinical research contribute at many stages: from trial design to patient safety post-marketing.

#### Roles that Pharmacists Can Fill in Clinical Research

Pharmacists' drug- and therapeutic-knowledge makes them very useful in several roles. Some key roles include.

#### Clinical Research Associate (CRA) :

Monitoring trial sites, ensuring compliance with protocol, ethics, regulatory requirements; verifying data; site visits.

#### Clinical Research Coordinator (CRC):

Day-to-day administration of trials, patient recruitment/follow-up, consent process, documentation, logistics.

#### > Clinical Trial Pharmacist:

Managing investigational drug supply, handling investigational products, ensuring storage, dispensing in compliance with trial protocol.

#### > Clinical Data Manager:

Ensuring data integrity, management of clinical trial databases, dealing with data gueries, cleaning data.

#### > Pharmacovigilance Specialist:

Monitoring, reporting, and analyzing adverse events, risk management post-market, ensuring patient safety.

#### > Regulatory Affairs:

Ensuring trials comply with laws (e.g. ethics, drug regulatory agencies), preparing submissions for approval, handling audits.

#### Medical/Scientific Writer:

Writing protocols, informed consent forms, study reports, publication articles, regulatory documents.

#### > Quality Assurance / Monitoring:

Audits, SOP development, ensuring Good Clinical Practice (GCP), ensuring quality systems in trial conduct.



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#### Why Pharmacists are Well-Placed for Clinical Research

- 1) Deep knowledge of pharmacology, pharmacokinetics, drug interactions, therapeutic windows, adverse effects.
- 2) Understanding of formulation, stability, handling of drugs helpful in investigational product management.
- 3) Training in ethics of drug use, patient safety.
- 4) Ability to interpret clinical literature.
- 5) Often good at working across teams: clinicians, regulators, data teams, etc.

#### Scope / Opportunities in India

- 1) India has become a significant hub for clinical trials: many pharma companies, CROs Contract Research Organizations), SMOs (Site Management Organizations), and hospitals are involved. This creates demand for skilled personnel.
- 2) Roles like CRA, CRC, Pharmacovigilance Specialist are reported to be accessible for B.Pharm / M.Pharm graduates.
- 3) Regulatory bodies (like CDSCO in India) also provide scope- both for clinical trial oversight and post-market surveillance.
- 4) There is increasing recognition of clinical pharmacists in hospitals & healthcare setup participating in or even initiating research.

#### **Challenges & Things to Keep in Mind**

- 1) Many trial sites & CROs have high demand but also high expectations: knowledge of regulatory guidelines (ICH-GCP, etc.), documentation skills, ethical issues, etc.
- 2) Sometimes roles are entry-level with modest pay initially; higher responsibilities require experience or further education (M.Pharm, specialized diplomas, certificates in clinical research).
- 3) The regulatory and legal landscape can be complex and sometimes slow approval processes, oversight can be time-consuming.
- 4) Keeping updated with constantly evolving guidelines (both national and international) is necessary.







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#### **Future Trends & Growth Areas**

- 1) More clinical trials being outsourced to India, especially as pharmaceutical companies seek cost-efficient trial locations.
- 2) Increase in complex trials: biologics, gene therapy, personalized medicine, which require more specialized roles.
- 3) Digital health / real-world evidence studies, data analytics, adaptive trial designs. Pharmacists with skills in data handling/statistics may find added opportunities.
- 4) Greater emphasis on patient safety, pharmacovigilance, post-marketing surveillance.
- 5) Regulatory harmonization (global standards) pushing for better quality, which increases demand for trained personnel.

#### **What Skills / Qualification Help**

- 1) Understanding of Good Clinical Practice (GCP), ICH guidelines, regulatory requirements.
- 2) Strong documentation, protocol writing, informed consent process skills.
- 3) Basic statistical knowledge, data management tools.
- 4) Ethical understanding.
- 5) Communication & collaboration skills (since trials involve many stakeholders).
- 6) Possibly further qualifications: certificate/diploma in clinical research, pharmacovigilance, M.Pharm, etc.


### > Principles of World Population Day:
